



Colorado Heights University Campus Safety Plan

In compliance with the Campus Security Act of 1990, Colorado Heights University is required to prepare, publish and distribute to all current students, employees and applicants for future enrollments or employment, upon request, the following information:

1. A statement of current campus policies regarding procedures and facilities for students and others to report criminal actions or other emergencies occurring on campus and policies concerning the institution's response to such reports.
2. A statement of current policies concerning security and access to campus facilities and security considerations used in the maintenance of campus facilities.
3. A statement of current policies concerning campus law enforcement, including the enforcement authority of institutional security personnel and policies that encourage prompt reporting of all campus crime.
4. A description of the type and frequency of programs designed to inform students and employees about campus security procedures and practices and to encourage them to be responsible for their own security and the security of others.
5. A description of programs designed to inform students and employees about the prevention of crimes.
6. A statement of policy concerning the monitoring and recording through local police agencies of criminal activity engaged in by students at off-campus locations of student organizations, including off-campus housing facilities. In recognition of federal legislation requiring this information, Colorado Heights University does not provide off-campus housing facilities.
7. Statistics concerning the occurrence on campus during the most recent calendar year, and during the two preceding calendar years for which data are available, of the following criminal offenses as required to be collected pursuant to Section 485 (a) and (f) of the Higher Education Act, in accordance with section 668.46 (c) (7) of the Federal Register/Vol. 64, № 210/Monday, November 1, 1999 Rules and Regulations.

PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICE

All Public Safety personnel are hired by CHU in compliance with Colorado law and are licensed by the City and County of Denver. Safety Officers routinely patrol campus areas in vehicles or on foot. They respond to all calls for service, including emergencies and unusual incidents. Officers do not have arrest powers, but can detain individuals until the arrival of Denver Police, if Public Safety Officers have probable cause that an individual has violated city, state or federal law. Denver Police officers make the final determination of charges filed and custody of detained persons. The Public Safety office takes action according to the following circumstances:

- The Denver Police Department investigates felony and serious misdemeanor crimes reported to Public Safety Office.
- Public Safety Officers investigate minor offenses, and involve Denver Police, at the request of the victim or the University. However, Denver Police may not dispatch officers to directly respond to such incidents.

All campus security personnel attend mandatory in-service training to keep up to date on regulations and to improve their skills, and all are trained in first aid/CPR and AED. The Public Safety Office has developed highly cooperative relationships with local police departments to help ensure prompt and efficient action in apprehending alleged criminals and preventing crime.

Crime Prevention — The Office of Public Safety in coordination with Denver Police and State Funded Programs will present educational programs on crime prevention topics ranging from drug and alcohol awareness to personal safety including sexual assault and rape. All students are encouraged to take precautions for their personal safety and attend presentations announced. Residents should also protect their personal property by engraving valuables with their student identification number. Safety tips will also be made available on the Campus Safety Web site.

REPORTING PROCEDURES:

REPORTING A CRIME OR OTHER EMERGENCY

The University adheres to the following policy regarding the reporting of crime:

Colorado Heights University strongly encourages the prompt and accurate reporting of all criminal or suspicious activities occurring on campus. Anyone who is a victim of a criminal offense on campus is instructed to immediately notify the Public Safety Office, which is open 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. A student, employee or any campus tenant who has witnessed any suspicious or apparent criminal action should also immediately contact Public Safety. Officers on duty can be reached at (303) 944-1420, the Campus safety office at (303) 419-6450, or the local police at 911. The Public Safety office is located at 3001 S. Federal Blvd., Denver CO 80236, Administration Building Room 110. Because Public Safety officers are regularly on patrol, individuals should contact Public Safety at (303 944-1420) to request an officer to respond or to meet at the Public Safety Office. Reports can also be made to Public safety officers patrolling on foot

or in marked vehicles. Public Safety Officers will immediately evaluate each report and take appropriate actions, such as calling an emergency medical team or reporting the matter to local police. Public Safety officers will also respond to the scene. When an officer arrives, a preliminary investigation will be completed, and further action will be completed by the Denver Police Department, if appropriate. In all cases, an incident report will be completed. Additional investigation may be conducted as necessary. If a student is identified as a suspect, the report will be forwarded to appropriate University officials for possible disciplinary action. Information, whether signed or anonymous, on any criminal or safety issue can be mailed to Public Safety Main Office, 3001 S. Federal Blvd, Denver, CO 80236, Admin Building, Room 111.

Anonymous reports can be made using the Campus Safety link www.chu.edu.

Colorado Heights University is not required to include crimes reported only to a pastoral or professional counselor in the crime statistics published in this report. Students who seek personal counseling are advised that if they disclose information that the counselor considers to be a current threat to others, the counselor may release the information to appropriate authorities including University administration, Public Safety Office, the local police, or the student's parents or guardians.

Students are also advised that the University will release information when required by law. In order to keep the campus community informed on an ongoing basis, the University will alert the community of certain crimes in a manner that is timely and will aid in the prevention of similar crimes. An alert will be issued and posted for all Clery Act crimes that are reported to campus security authorities, or are reported to the University by local police agencies, and are considered by the University to represent a serious or continuing threat to students and employees. These postings inform community members of the nature of the critical incident, the manner in which to report similar incidents, and, in addition, provide prevention tips to avoid being victimized. The Public Safety Office also maintains a written Daily Crime Log that is available for review upon request.

What will happen when you report non-injury type criminal offenses?

The Public Safety Officer will proceed as follows:

1. Make contact with the person(s) involved in the criminal offense to ascertain what has occurred.
2. Advise Director of Public Safety.
3. Wait with the victim(s) until the Student Service representative arrives.
4. Public Safety Officer has the authority to detain individuals suspected of criminal offenses until a campus official arrives.
5. Complete a criminal offense report.
6. Deliver copies of the criminal offense report to the Director of Public Safety or the President.

What will happen when you report on-campus injury-related criminal offenses & medical emergencies?

The Public Safety Officer is to be notified immediately of any injury-related criminal offense or medical emergency.

The Public Safety Officer will do the following:

1. Make contact with each person injured in the criminal offense or who is/are a victim/victims of the medical emergency.
2. Advise the person(s) that the police have been called and that medical treatment is being sought.
3. Wait with the victim(s) until the police and emergency personnel arrive.
4. Complete a criminal offense report.
5. Deliver copies of the criminal offense report immediately to the Director of Public Safety Office and the President. The liability insurance company will also receive copies of the criminal offense report.
6. File a copy of the criminal offense report in the liability insurance file.
7. File the original copy of the criminal offense report in the student(s) file.
8. Update the current year Criminal Offense Report (COR) and place a copy of the report in the COR File.

CRIME and FIRE STATISTICS

Crime statistics for Colorado Heights University are prepared by the Public Safety Office. Colorado Heights University compiles its crime statistics using the uniform crime reporting system of the Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation, including any modifications pursuant to the Hate Crime Statistics Act. This Report is published in Spring. Please note that the University's crime statistics include not only crimes that have been reported to state and local police authorities, but also crimes reported to campus security authorities which may not have been reported to the police (for example, minor violations of the Student Code of Conduct or crimes where the victim chooses not to press criminal charges). The primary source for Colorado Heights University's statistics is reports received by the University's Public Safety Office. All crimes involving University students, personnel, and/or property are required to be reported to Public Safety. Finally, the crime statistics include crimes that have occurred in or on non-campus buildings and property owned or controlled by Colorado Heights University or by an officially recognized student organization, as well as on public property (including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities) that is adjacent to and accessible from the campus. The University requests information on these crimes from state and/or local police agencies for inclusion in the crime statistics whether or not they were previously reported to campus security authorities.

Another report made public in the fall is prepared according to the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Office of Public Safety Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. The two reports have different reporting requirements -- including definitions of crimes, reporting authorities and the geographical areas considered. Daily Crime Logs are kept that include the date and time a crime was reported, where the crime occurred, the nature of the crime and the result of the complaint if it is known, unless the disclosure is prohibited by law or confidentiality. Information must be disclosed, at a point in time, when no adverse effects could impact the incident further.

A Fire Safety Report and Log is also available in the fall of each year. It includes the number and cause of each fire, injuries related to the fire, the number of deaths and/or the value of property damaged by the fire. Also, included are descriptions of each housing facility that include fire safety systems, the number of drills held in the previous calendar year, rules and regulations on devices/equipment allowed in residence halls, procedures for evacuation, safety education and training, reporting procedures and plans for future improvements. Similar to the crime statistics, the fire log will include the nature, date, time and general location of each fire.

The above mentioned logs are available to the public for 60 days during normal business operations and logs older than 60 days can be made available within two business days of a request.

The above information will be made available on the Colorado Heights University website (www.chu.edu) and a statement made of its availability to current and prospective students, as well as employees.

KEEPING THE UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY INFORMED

A major goal of the University is to keep students, faculty and staff informed about campus security procedures and to encourage them to act responsibly to ensure their own safety and the safety of others. Incoming freshmen students are instructed on how to report a crime or emergency, on the functions of the Public Safety Office, and on the consequences of possessing drugs, alcohol or other contraband on campus. In addition, annual faculty and staff training is provided as requested. Periodic information is distributed to all community members in newsletters and other sources or at meetings and other events in the form of fliers or class announcements. Information will also be displayed in public places.

TIMELY WARNING POLICY

The Campus Crime Alert "Alert" gives students, faculty, and staff timely notification of crimes that may represent a serious or on-going threat to the campus community and to heighten safety awareness. The Alert also seeks information that may lead to arrest and conviction of the offender when violent crimes against persons or substantial crimes against property have been reported.

The Public Safety Office is responsible for issuing a Campus Crime Alert when a crime is reported to or brought to the attention of the Public Safety officers or other campus

security authorities and that crime represents a serious or on-going threat to the safety of members of the campus community. Information for Alerts also comes from other law enforcement agencies. Every attempt will be made to distribute the Alert promptly; however, the release is subject to the availability of accurate facts concerning the incident. Alerts, are created and distributed by Public Safety staff with the assistance of CHU ENS Notification System.

CHU ENS Notification System to Enhance Emergency Preparedness:

The safety of our students, faculty and staff is a priority at Colorado Heights University. The ability to quickly provide notice, accurate information and instructions without delay during a situation is crucial. To accomplish this, CHU has subscribed to redundant emergency notification systems that will allow CHU campus leaders and security personnel to deliver time-sensitive text message notifications to our students, faculty and staff during unforeseen events or emergencies. CHU ENS systems will only be used during emergencies (and for related tests.)

Timely Warning Procedure

The Public Safety Office will prepare a Campus Crime Alert whenever a report is received of a violent crime against a person or a substantial crime against property on campus that represents a serious or on-going threat to the safety of students, faculty, and staff. Alerts are assigned the same number as the corresponding Public Safety Incident report and will provide details of the crime, a description of the suspect (if known), information on whom to contact with information, and safety tips.

Campus Crime Alerts will be emailed as quickly as possible to faculty, staff, and students, distributed throughout the campus TV network channel 32, posted on the Colorado Heights University website, and posted on Public Safety information boards.

Campus Crime Alerts typically include the following information:

1. A brief statement of the incident.
2. Any connection to previous incidents.
3. Physical description and/or composite drawing of the suspect, or a photo if appropriate.
4. Date and time the Alert was released.
5. Other relevant and important information.
6. Appropriate safety tips.

ALERT PROCEDURE

If the following alert codes are issued, the Colorado Heights University campus will operate per below:

The following Threat Conditions each represent an increasing risk of an incident or crisis.

1. **Code (Green), No Threat.** The University will operate under Code Green on most occasions. Code Green indicates there is no condition or threat to University Property or the CHU Campus Community. Any incidents reported can be handled by normal daily operations of Maintenance and the Office of Public Safety.

2. Code (Yellow), Caution is warranted. Notification will be sent to Faculty, Staff, Management and Tenants via e-mail and text messaging methods. This represents any incident that will not seriously affect the overall functioning of the campus. This code is to be used in the need of increased awareness, surveillance, assessment of building damage, assessment of whether the threat requires further discussion or determination, protective measures or implementation of an action plan, contingency or emergency response. This could include attention and awareness of all persons entering the campus and the report of any suspicious activities or conditions discovered on campus.

3. Code (Orange), On Alert. A higher alert notification involving mass e-mail and cell phone text messaging to ALL of Campus Community including students with the potential of a modified lockdown. As in lockdown procedures, President and Director of Public Safety have authorization to call the code. This is declared when any incident affects an entire building or buildings and potentially disrupts the operation of the University. There is a higher risk of incident and necessary steps should be taken for the CHU Community to be aware of a potential threat or severe damage to University property. This includes a modified lockdown procedure where exterior doors will be locked and access will be controlled by Public Safety and Building Coordinators, however, people will be free to roam around within the building. No one can exit the building until ALL CLEAR is given by Public Safety Personal. The President of Colorado Heights University or designee may cancel classes on campus until further notice. In this code, there is a potential for the need of outside community services. It is possible that CHU or a specific location on campus may need to move to an alternative site, disperse some of or all of the workforce; and restrict access to the facility, except for essential personnel. CHU Public Safety will routinely check staff and students for proper identification during Code Orange.

4. Code (Red), Emergency Lockdown.

- During the LOCKDOWN all school business should cease immediately.
- Teachers should gather students away from doors and lock the classroom doors from inside.
- Stay down.
- Stay quiet.
- Stay out of site.

A Severe Condition that reflects the risk. These incidents/events require activation of all the Emergency Notification methods, including campus radios, phone system alerts, mass e-mails, cell phone text messaging, and word of mouth. Coordination between campus departments and community services are required for an effective response to the incident. There may be an increase in or redirecting of personnel to address critical emergency needs; assigning emergency response personnel and mobilizing trained teams or resources. Monitoring, redirecting, or constraining transportation. CHU Public Safety will call in personnel for the purpose of securing the campus and contact the President regarding communications or media. The Risk Management Team will be placed on alert to assist in anyway they can. The President of Colorado Heights

University or designee may cancel classes on campus until further notice. University buildings will be locked and access will be denied to all non-essential personnel. All staff must have University IDs and visitors must possess driver's license or other form of picture ID to allow visiting privileges. Overhead announcements and further instructions are delivered via CHU Phones and Paging System. **After interior doors are secured, an initial roll call is taken by the faculty or staff member present in a given locked area and a message left with a brief status of all accounted for or any missing individuals and their last known location at lockdown@chu.edu.**

During this time, no visitors will be permitted on campus. Exterior and interior doors will be locked, signs posted and Building Coordinators and Public Safety Personnel will go through the Lockdown Checklist.

ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES AND RESIDENCES

Access to Campus Facilities

During the periods of time that the University is normally in operation (this excludes most holidays), buildings and facilities are generally accessible to members of the campus community, guests, and visitors during normal business hours, Monday through Friday, and for limited designated hours on Saturdays and Sundays. Public Safety Officers patrol the campus 24 hours per day, seven days per week. Officers maintain an access list to University facilities.

Access to Residence Halls

The exterior doors to student residence halls are to remain locked at all times. Access is available to students only by use of their student pass code. Pass codes are changed at minimum of once a year, but more often than not, it occurs every six months. Guests from outside the building are to be escorted by their hosts in compliance with the Residence Hall contract.

General Access Policy

If an unscheduled door unlock is required, approval from the Director of Public Safety is needed to unlock doors. These unlocks are logged into a daily report. The Officer is required to check ID of all persons requesting unlocks, as well as the Public Safety Office Access List. If the person cannot provide such identification, the officer is required to seek authorization from the administrative person on duty. Certain areas of the campus have limited or "Authorized Personnel Only" status which precludes granting entry. If the person is not on the list, officers will not unlock the door and must call for authorization to the Director of Public Safety.

CAMPUS SEX CRIMES PREVENTION ACT (CSCPA)

The CSCPA provisions appear in subsection (j) of the Wetterling Act [42 U.S.C. 14071(j)]. As provided in subsection (j), any person required to register under a state sex offender registration program must notify the state concerning each institution of

higher education in the state at which the person is a student or works, and of each change in enrollment or employment status of the person at such an institution. State procedures must also ensure that information concerning a registrant enrolled or working at an institution of higher education is promptly made available to a law enforcement agency having jurisdiction where the institution is located, and entered into the appropriate state records or data system. In accordance with requirements of the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, information concerning registered sex offenders employed, enrolled as a student, or carrying on a vocation at this institution can be obtained, to the extent permitted by law, by contacting the Denver Police Department — Sex Offense Registration Unit (1331 Cherokee Street, Denver, CO 80204) at 720-913-6050 or <http://sor.state.co.us>. **CRIME**

CHU Sexual Assault Policy

Acts of sexual assault will not be tolerated at Colorado Heights University.

All reported instances of sexual assault will be investigated and appropriate disciplinary, criminal, and/or legal action will be taken with the consent of the victim(s).

In addition, Colorado Heights University will endeavor to assist any student who is sexually assaulted on campus.

All personnel have been informed to notify the Public Safety Officer, Director of Public Safety Office or the President in cases of sexual assault.

This to be done immediately, following any necessary and appropriate emergency steps taken to aid the victim(s), but only upon the victim(s)' consent, (i.e., providing first aid, calling an ambulance, etc.).

Upon the victim(s)' consent, this is what will happen:

1. The Public Safety Officer will immediately make contact with the student(s) involved in the sexual assault.
2. The President or designee of CHU will be immediately notified and will make immediate contact with the student(s).
3. Upon the student(s)' consent, the police and/or an ambulance service will be called. Students are advised to seek medical attention in order to be tested and/or treated for sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy.
4. If the student(s) prefers private transportation to the hospital, it will be arranged through the student(s)' emergency contact person(s).
5. The Public Safety Officer will complete a criminal offense form and follow outlined procedures for processing the form.
6. The victim(s) will be provided information via the sexual assault policy that outlines the victim(s)' options for civil or criminal prosecution or availability of mediation and the disciplinary process. The President or designee will make

available to the victim(s) current civil and criminal prosecution information obtained through the local police and district attorney's offices.

7. Confidentiality of the incident(s) must be maintained for the victim(s) under all circumstances. The Public Safety Officer will keep all students and unauthorized personnel away from the victim(s), must not allow the press to contact the victim(s) without the victim(s)' permission, and must only contact the spouse(s) or parents upon the victim(s)' authorized consent.
8. See Sexual Assault Referral Sheet on the next page.
9. The student(s) will be notified in writing, by the CHU's President or designee, of the disciplinary action taken by the University, if the student(s) was assaulted by another student(s) or employee(s) of the University.
10. A meeting will be arranged between the victim(s) Academic Dean to discuss the victim(s) return to school and any assistance needed by the victim(s) to deal with academic difficulties that may arise due to victimization and its impact on the victim(s). If the victim is a CHU resident, the Director of Residence Life will provide assistance with changes to their living arrangements.

Both parties involved in the alleged incident are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during disciplinary proceedings.

Important Facts about Sexual Assault To Be Made Available To Students Upon Request

What is Sexual Assault?

- Any sexual act attempted or committed against a person's will
- Manipulation or coercion, as well as physical force, used to cause sexual contact

Colorado Law defines "rape" as sexual intercourse, sodomy, or oral copulation accomplished against the victim's will.

Rape is punishable by imprisonment. If you force sexual activity on another person against his/her will, it is sexual assault.

Any person sexually assaulting a person on school premises will be subject to any or all of the following:

- student disciplinary action
- civil law suit
- criminal charges

If You Are a Victim of Sexual Assault:

If you are a victim of sexual assault on campus, do the following:

- Go to a safe place.
- Immediately contact a Public Safety Officer. If you are unable to do so yourself, have another student, staff or faculty member contact a Public Safety Officer. Officers are on 24 hours per day, 7 days a week. The Public Safety Office is located in the administration building ground level room 110 or you can call them at 303 937-4555 or 303 944-1420.
- Upon your consent, police and/or an ambulance will be called.

Getting help from the police does not mean you have to press charges. However, it is important that you get medical attention to be tested and/or treated for sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy.

Victims of sexual assault have legal rights. You have the right to file a police report and to pursue civil or criminal charges.

Prevention Tips:

The following information is provided to help you to avoid sexual assault. The more you know about rape prevention, the better your chances are of not becoming a victim. First, know the facts about rape. Become aware of locations and situations where rape might occur and avoid them.

- Consider your alternatives if confronted by a rapist. Practice possible responses so that you can recall them even under the stress of a real encounter.
- Avoid walking alone off campus.
- Don't give out any information about other classmates to strangers.
- Report all suspicious activity to a staff or faculty member.
- Let a friend or family member know when you expect to be home.
- Be alert and aware of your surroundings.

CHU Hate Crimes Policy

Acts of hate crime will not be tolerated at Colorado Heights University.

All reported instances of a hate crime will be investigated and appropriate disciplinary, criminal, and/or legal action will be taken with the consent of the victim(s).

All personnel have been informed to notify the Public Safety Officer, Director of Public Safety Office or the President in cases of hate crime.

This to be done immediately following any necessary and appropriate emergency steps taken to aid the victim(s), but only upon the victim(s)' consent.

Upon the victim(s)' consent, the procedure is as follows:

1. The Public Safety Officer will immediately make contact with the student(s) or employee(s) involved in the hate crime.
2. The President or designee of CHU will be immediately notified and will make immediate contact with the victim(s).
3. Upon the victim(s)' consent, the police and/or an ambulance service will be called.
4. If the victim(s) prefers private transportation to the hospital, it will be arranged through the Public Safety office.
5. The Public Safety Officer will complete a criminal offense form and follow outlined procedures for processing the form.
6. Confidentiality of the incident(s) must be maintained for the victim(s) under all circumstances. The Public Safety Officer will keep all students, employee and unauthorized personnel away from the victim(s), must not allow the press to contact the victim(s) without the victim(s) permission, and must only contact the spouse(s) or parents upon the victim(s) authorized consent.
7. The victim(s) will be notified in writing, by the CHU's President or designee, of the disciplinary action taken by the University, if the victim(s) was assaulted by another student(s) or employee(s) of the University.
8. A meeting will be arranged between the victim(s) Academic Dean to discuss the victim(s) return to school and any assistance needed by the victim(s) to deal with academic difficulties that may arise due to the victimization and its impact on the victim(s).

What is a Hate Crime?

Any crime committed against a person based on: Race, Gender, Religion, Sexual Orientation, Ethnicity/national origin or disability.

Race: A preformed negative attitude toward a group of persons who possess common physical characteristics (e.g., color of skin, eyes, and/or hair; facial features, etc.) genetically transmitted by descent and heredity which distinguish them as a distinct division of humankind (e.g., Asians, blacks, whites).

Gender: A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons because those persons are male or female.

Religion: A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons who share the same religious beliefs regarding the origin and purpose of the universe and the existence or nonexistence of a supreme being (e.g., Catholics, Jews, Protestants, Atheists).

Sexual orientation: A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their sexual attraction toward, and responsiveness to, members of their own sex or members of the opposite sex (e.g., gays, lesbians, heterosexuals).

Ethnicity/national origin: A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons of the same race or national origin who share common or similar traits, languages, customs and traditions (e.g., Arabs, Hispanics).

Disability: A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their physical or mental impairments/challenges, whether such disability is temporary or permanent, congenital or acquired by heredity, accident, injury, advanced age or illness.

Drug and Alcohol Abuse Policy

Colorado Heights University (CHU) is dedicated to providing a campus culture that maintains an academic and social environment conducive to the intellectual and personal development of students and to the safety and welfare of all members of the University community. CHU is, therefore, committed to having a campus that is free of the use, abuse, sale, manufacture, distribution or cultivation of controlled substances or alcohol. Controlled substances include, but are not limited to marijuana, cocaine, amphetamines, etc.

CHU expects individuals to be responsible for their personal behavior and does not condone the consumption of alcoholic beverages or controlled substances. The University considers substance abuse to be detrimental to its mission and goals. In keeping with this commitment, it is the policy of CHU that the illegal and/or abusive use of drugs or alcohol is prohibited on campus property or as part of campus activities. CHU also serves notice of its intent to observe all national, state and local laws and offers educational programs in order to limit its liability.

In order to inform all University employees and students of their responsibilities under this policy, the following information is provided:

I. Prohibited Conduct.

II. Disciplinary Action.

III. Applicable Legal Sanctions under Federal, State and Local Laws.

IV. Health Risks Associated with the Use of Illegal Drugs and/or Abuse of Alcohol.

V. Responsible Administrative Office.

I. PROHIBITED CONDUCT

The University prohibits the possession, use, distribution, manufacture, or dispensing of illicit drugs or any controlled substances by students, employees, residents, visitors, clients, or any other occupants on University property or as part of University activities. The use or possession of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on University premises. Without exception, alcohol consumption is governed by Colorado statutory age restrictions.

A. Students, employees, residents, visitors, clients, or any other occupants are prohibited from:

1. Abusing alcohol or drugs;
2. Committing a controlled dangerous substance offense;
3. Committing an alcohol driving offense;
4. Working, attending class or participating in a University activity while under the influence of alcohol;
5. Working, attending class or participating in a University activity while under the influence of a controlled dangerous substance.

II. DISCIPLINARY ACTION for violation of the Drug and Alcohol Policy

A. Students

A student, who is determined to have violated the University's Drug and Alcohol Policy, is referred to the Director of Public Safety and the President's Office to initiate disciplinary action, which is outlined in the University Code of Student Conduct & Disciplinary Procedures. Disciplinary Action may include, but is not limited to suspension or expulsion from the University.

B. Employees

Any employee found to have abused drugs and alcohol while on campus shall be subject to disciplinary action set forth in applicable University personnel policies. Potential disciplinary actions include, but are not limited to, suspension and termination from University service.

C. Residents, visitors, clients, or any other occupants

If any residents, visitors, clients, or any other occupants found to have abused drugs and alcohol while on campus shall be subject to detention and transport to Denver Police and possible eviction from campus.

III. APPLICABLE LEGAL SANCTIONS UNDER FEDERAL, STATE AND LOCAL LAWS RELATING TO ALCOHOL AND DRUG USE.

Students, employees, residents, visitors, clients, or any other occupants at the University are subject to federal, state, and local laws regarding the possession and distribution of illegal drugs. Each person shall be expected to abide by those laws and will be held responsible by civil law enforcement agencies for his or her own actions in any situation involving violations of federal, state and local laws regarding substance abuse.

Students, employees, residents, visitors, clients, or any other occupants at the University are subject to state and local laws for drinking and obtaining alcohol. It is illegal in the State of Colorado for any person under 21 years of age to purchase or drink alcohol. It is also illegal for a person under 21 years of age to falsify or misrepresent his or her age to obtain alcohol, or to possess alcoholic beverages with the intent to consume them. It is also illegal in most situations to furnish alcohol to a person less than 21 years of age.

Students, employees, residents, visitors, clients, or any other occupants of the University are also subject to state and local laws governing drinking and driving. A person may not drive or attempt to drive while intoxicated or under the influence of alcohol.

It is also unlawful to drive while under the influence of any Controlled Dangerous Substances whether or not they are illicit (prescribed or unlawfully obtained). A person can still be charged with these violations even though they possess a driver's license from another state.

IV. HEALTH RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH THE USE AND ABUSE OF ALCOHOL AND ILLICIT DRUGS

Substance abuse, the abuse of alcohol and drugs, is now recognized as the number one public health problem in the United States. Approximately 30% of all admissions to general hospitals and 50% of admissions to psychiatric hospitals have detectable substance abuse. Substance abuse accounts for approximately 150,000 deaths annually. This includes deaths from stroke, disease of the heart and liver, and all alcohol and drug related suicides, homicides, and accidents. Early detection can minimize or prevent the devastating consequences of substance abuse.

Substance abuse and substance dependence are two different phenomena, as delineated below. Taken together, however, they are the leading cause of death, dysfunction and disability for much of the working-age population individuals between the age of 18 and 50.

Substance abuse is a practiced behavior involving intoxication and high risk actions. Substance abuse is a pattern of behavior (not a disease) which involves use of alcohol or drugs to levels of disinhibition and associated high risk actions. Substance abuse is periodically practiced by twenty to eighty percent of the people who are between 20 and 40 years old.

Substance dependence is a disease that responds to treatment and relapses when treatment is stopped. Substance dependence is a disease affecting ten to twelve percent of the population, resulting in an intermittent inability to control the use of alcohol or drugs, with repetitive adverse consequences. As a disease, it has defined risk factors, signs and symptoms, a predictable natural history, a good response to treatment if treatment is effectively embraced, and a risk of relapse if the treatment regimen is not followed.

V. RESPONSIBLE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE

The Policy on Drug and Alcohol Abuse shall be distributed as follows:

Missing Persons Policy

When a student checks into the dorm, the Director of Residents Life at Colorado Heights University will inform the student residing on campus housing that the Director of Residents Life will notify either a parent or an individual selected by the student no later than 24 hours after the time that the student is deemed to be missing. The information provided to the resident students will include the following:

Students have the option of identifying an individual to be contacted by the Director of Residents Life no later than 24 hours after the time that the student has been determined to be missing. Students can register this confidential contact information through the Director of Residents Life Office.

Designated Emergency Contact information will only be made available to authorized campus personnel and law enforcement officials.

If the resident student is under 18 years of age, and not an emancipated individual, the Director of Residents Life must notify a custodial parent or guardian within 24 hours after the time that the student is determined to be missing.

The Department of Public Safety will notify the appropriate local law enforcement agency no later than 24 hours after the time that the student is determined to be missing.

If the Department of Public Safety and/or the local law enforcement agency has been notified and makes a determination that a student who is the subject of a missing person report has been missing and has not returned to campus, the Director of Residents Life will initiate the emergency contact procedure in accordance with the student's designation.

Department of Public Safety

The Department of Public Safety, upon notification of a missing student, will conduct a thorough investigation and obtain all necessary information. The person's description, clothes, who they may be with or where they may be, vehicle description and the physical and mental well being of the individual will be obtained.

The Department of Public Safety will conduct a quick, but thorough search of the campus buildings and parking lots using the student's class schedule.

The Department of Public Safety may also request assistance from Resident Assistants or others to assist in a search on campus. The Department of Public Safety may issue an ID card photograph to assist in the identification of the missing student.

After a search has been conducted with negative results, the Department of Safety will notify the local law enforcement agency.

Notification Procedure

Colorado Heights University campus will follow the following notification procedure for a missing student who resides on campus:

Any reports of missing students are to be referred immediately to the Department of Public Safety. If it is determined that the student is missing, the Director of Residents Life will contact the individual identified by the student or the custodial parent or legal guardian if the student is under the age 18 and not emancipated.

Fire Logs

A fire log with the nature, date, time, and location of any fire that occurred in an on-campus housing facility for the most recent 60-day period is available for review during normal business hours at Campus Safety & Security at your campus. Requests for fire log information dated prior to the 60-day time period will be provided upon request.

Smoking Policy Smoking is strictly prohibited in all campus facilities. This includes, but is not limited to, common work areas, classrooms, conference and meeting rooms, private offices, elevators, hallways, stairs, restrooms, vehicles and all other enclosed facilities.

Evacuation Plan

1. Call 911. Give CHU's address – 3001 South Federal Blvd., Denver, CO
2. A steady series of blasts will sound from the fire alarm.
3. Individuals shall evacuate the area immediately. Follow the emergency safety routes as shown on the Evacuation Route, and **assemble on the lawn located east, west or south of the administration building at least 100 feet from the building, until you have been notified by security personnel that it is safe to return to the building.**
4. All vehicles next to the building shall be removed (upon request only).

Reasons for evacuation include:

1. **Bomb threat.**
2. **Fire alarm.**
3. **Chemical spill**
4. **Gas leak**
5. **Hazardous material or bio-hazard threat evacuate only if instructed by safety personal.**

Administration building fire evacuation plan

Designated Staff

FIRST FLOOR

The Public Safety Officer(s) will check all rooms on the first floor and direct all students and personnel out of the building through the nearest exit doors.

SECOND FLOOR

The Public Safety Officer(s) will check all restrooms, staff lounge, chapel, and offices and direct students and personnel out of the building through the nearest exit door(s).

The Public Safety Officer(s) shall direct traffic from the corridors to the exits, and then proceed to the designated area.

UPPER FLOORS

ALL faculty shall direct traffic from their classrooms to the corridors, then proceed to the designated area outside (**assemble on the lawn located west of the administration building at least 100 feet from the building**). Also emphasize **NOT to light any cigarettes** near the building for EVERYONE to remain at designated area until CHU

Administrative STAFF has been given the "All Clear" by security personnel or the Fire Department.

Student Services will be outside directing traffic to the front lawn directly in front of the administration building, provide instructions to all individuals **NOT to light any cigarettes.**

Dormitory Fire Evacuation Plan
(Walsh Hall, Marian Hall and Pan Hall)

All occupants of the building must exit the building immediately

1. Close your room door as you leave the building **DO NOT PROP FIRE DOORS OPEN**
2. Move away from the building 100 feet
3. Stay away from the road for emergency vehicles arrival
4. Available Community Assistant (CA) member will be at the exits of the building to assist the Public Safety Officer.

Evacuation Plan

Public Safety Officers will respond to the building to check the area for fire or smoke and stand for Fire Department arrival.

Machebeuf Hall Fire Evacuation Plan

Cafeteria staff will notify security and direct students to exit.

Public safety officer will:

1. Direct traffic from lower level.
2. Check the area for fire or smoke.
3. Stand by for Fire Department arrival.

Theater Fire Evacuation Plan

Theater staff will notify security and direct people to the exits.

Public Safety Officer will:

1. Check the area for fire or smoke.
2. Stand by for Fire Department arrival.

Library Fire Evacuation Plan

Library staff will notify security and direct people to the exits.

Public Safety Officer will:

1. Check the area for fire or smoke.
2. Stand by for Fire Department arrival.

TORNADO

In the event that a tornado warning is issued, students and residents should go to the basement or internal hallways on lower floors. Do not use elevators. Once students and residents arrive in a safe area, they should follow the directions of security staff and stay calm. Do not go outside the building and stay away from windows. Tornado warnings are signified by a steady blast from the siren located near Walsh and Marian Halls.
